

Eritrea -- Sudan -- Ethiopia



Background Information

In the 1960s, internal tensions, continuing droughts, and armed revolts caused important population shifts in many African countries such as in Ethiopia, Somalia, Sudan, Djibouti and Eritrea.

Depending on conflicts or lulls in uprisings, civilian populations were forced to migrate towards the most peaceful areas. What is strange is that Ethiopian refugees can be found in Sudan, and Sudanese refugees in Ethiopia. One group fled from the war with their neighbour Eritrea, and the other tried to escape the massacres in southern Sudan.

In this troubled context where conflicts follow one after another, the victims most affected are young children. Sometimes torn from their family by the unforeseen events of war, these children do not live a normal childhood and few can count on a full education. Many people end up in refugee camps. They find peace there, but they do not often have access to water, food, nor proper medication.

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Instructions

In order to better understand realities of displaced populations, students are asked to carefully read the story of a young person in a country at war. While reading the story, students will have a choice on the development of the storyline. As well, they will have to imagine and describe the living conditions of young Ethiopian while writing a short text.
