

Background Information

The civil war which lasted sixteen years (1977-1992) is the principal cause of the placement of mines on the Mozambican territory. Throughout this war, which began after the country's independence, more than one million Mozambican civilians died due to fatal confrontations and the presence of immense minefields.

Students are invited, initially, to read the informative text. After, they will try to answer the questions to assess their understanding of the text.



1. The civil war that lasted from 1977 to 1992 in Mozambique.

2. One action was the part played in the process to abolish landmines (Treaty of Ottawa) and a second action is the participation, via the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), in aid programs to eliminate landmines in Mozambique.

3. Pro: According to the manufacturers, the mines only aim to immobilize fighters (paragraph # 3).

Con: Mines do not make any distinction between a soldier and a civilian (paragraph # 3).

Con: Fourteen years after the end of the war, a few million anti-personnel and anti-tank landmines are still present and continue to harm people, making new amputees each year. (paragraph # 3).

Con: The mines are currently a major obstacle to the economic development of the country (paragraph # 7). Other answers are possible.
