

In Senegal, women are under-represented in decision-making positions at both local and national levels. This phenomenon is above all linked to the socio-cultural context generated by a patriarchal system conferring control of power to men. Some Senegalese organizations, however, allow women to meet and organize, reinforcing their negotiating power in the face of local political and traditional institutions. Furthermore, mobilization campaigns and pressure on political representatives have led to the adoption of laws in favour of improving women's social status and the modification of laws that discriminate against women.
